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Manmohan Singh: Architect of India's Global Aspirations and Economic Renaissance

Its legacy continues, underpinning bilateral initiatives like the Initiative on Critical and Emerging Technology (iCET). Singh's pragmatism and foresight ensured India's integration into the global economy, fostering long-term partnerships and regional cooperation.

Singh's foreign policy was rooted in five guiding principles, including stable, mutually beneficial ties and a "shared destiny" for South Asia. He advocated for greater regional connectivity and valued India's plural, secular democracy as a model for global inspiration. His efforts extended beyond the nuclear deal, encompassing improved ties with ASEAN, the Look West Policy to bolster Gulf relations, and an enduring focus on poverty alleviation through trade and economic integration.

While his tenure saw criticism for being "soft" on Pakistan, Singh pursued back-channel diplomacy, nearing a non-territorial solution to the Kashmir issue. His pragmatic engagement with China, including infrastructure projects in Arunachal Pradesh and deft handling of border tensions, highlighted his nuanced approach to diplomacy.

Manmohan Singh's contributions to India's economic reforms, beginning with the 1991 liberalisation, transformed the nation's trajectory. His humility, simplicity, and dedication to consensus-building resonate deeply. As India mourns one of its noblest sons, his enduring legacies in economic reform and international diplomacy will continue to guide the nation's aspirations.
