Strengthening Ties at Foreign Ministers' Framework Dialogue

External Affairs Minister of India S. Jaishankar held 13th Foreign Ministers' Framework Dialogue with his Australian counterpart Penny Wong in Canberra on October 10, 2022. The two countries which are Comprehensive Strategic Partners and Quad partners, have common ambition of peace and sovereignty in the Indo-Pacific region. In light of the same, geopolitical challenges that are reshaping the Indo-Pacific region were discussed at length. The Foreign Ministers' dialogue laid emphasis on accelerating deeper economic ties through Economic Cooperation and Trade Agreement (ECTA). Other highlights include strengthening people-to-people ties, educational links, defence and security cooperation and clean energy engagement.
